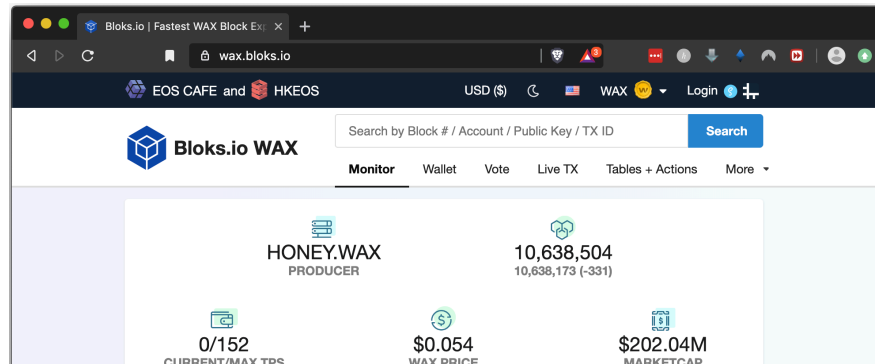


## Part 4 – Staking WAX on Bloks.io



Once you've successfully logged into the wax.bloks.io website you can easily claim and stake your WAX tokens. More information can be found here: <https://wax.io/blog/earn-more-wax-introducing-wax-block-rewards-staking-and-voting-guilds-and-more>

Staking your WAX tokens that you just received from claiming your GBM and Voting rewards is a simple process. The reason why you'd want to stake these tokens is to earn tokens on your tokens. It's the compounding effect. Once you stake your WAX tokens you will not be able to gain access to them for a minimum of 3 days. All staked WAX has to be unlocked before it can be moved. This unlocking process takes 3 days. So just be aware of that and remember to un-stake prior to moving them.

**Step 1** – Click on the “Wallet” region on the top navigation bar (also known as the nav bar)

**Step 2** – Click on the “Stake CPU/NET” region on the left-hand nav bar.

**Step 3** – Review your “Liquid Balance”. This is the balance you received when you claimed your GBM and voting rewards.

**Step 4** – This should be auto filled with your WAX address. If your Receiver of Stake does not have an address, please fill your address in here. You can also gift this stake to another address and stake it into their WAX wallet. Your address should look similar to xxxxx.waa and can be found at the top right-hand corner of the page.

**Step 5** – You need to stake your “Liquid Balance” to either CPU or NET. Honestly, it doesn't really matter how you spread it. I always use 50% CPU - 50% RAM. When you click the 50% button it will auto-fill the amount.

**Step 6** – Click the Stake button

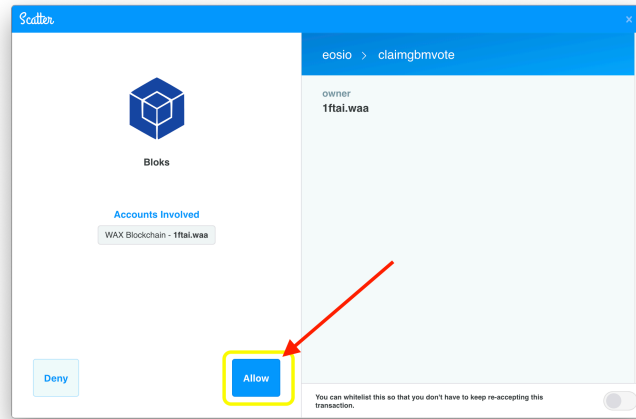

**Step 7** – Approve the transaction in your Scatter wallet



OR

**Step 7** – Approve the transaction on your Ledger. You will be able to view the number of WAX going into your NET and CPU stake.






**Step 8** – Hydrate yourself with your favorite beverage.

**Step 9** – If your stake was successful you will see a notification at the bottom of the page

**Step 10** – Verify your Liquid Balance. Your liquid balance is your WAX token balance that has not been staked. If you have a 0 balance, your stake was successful. If you have a random weird number like 1,e-8 WAX, don't worry about it, it's fine. It just means it could not split it and use all your tokens.

**Step 11** – You will see that your CPU and NET number has updated to include your new stake.
